However sensible and healthy it might be and even though we might agree with it's sentiments and have experienced the benefits of doing it, it's one of those things that rarely reaches the top of the 'to do' pile when life is full and busy.


As this newsletter drops onto your door mat or into your inbox, the academic year will have come to an end and the holidays will be upon us. Supposedly a time to stop, pause, and recoup but holidays can be exhausting with the amount of preparation and organisation that's needed. The list of people we want to visit seems to expand, the jobs waiting to be done, 'when we get a moment', seem to have increased from a note to a small booklet!

Two things have caught my attention recently and they have both taken only a moment to engage with, but have allowed me to pause and think. The first, is this quote. I suggest you read it, then reread it.

"On the one side the drive to accelerate is constant due to the absence of constraints as any larger patterns and given rituals are shattered. There are no givens, everything is in flux. It seems that the remedy is so simple: if one is exhausted, one should rest. Yet rest presupposes ontological trust that the world will not crumble and that the gods do not need to be fed. In short, resting implies a myth where each person is invited to rest by an all—powerful God."

To be still and know God won't just happen. It takes a conscious effort, and sometimes planning, to create good space, not just scraps of time. To develop good rhythms of life in which to work and rest and to find balance is something that has to be fought for. Zacchaeus had none while Jesus had many! The change in Zacchaeus meant he gained friends. When you are 3 or 4 years old this is very important information! I had created a new Big Book with free online images. They are so bright and colourful that they naturally draw the children (and adults!) into the story telling.



It's in this story we find a very simple case of actions speak louder than words, as Zacchaeus returned the stolen money plus more and people could see and feel the difference that his encounter with Jesus had made.


"I used to ask God to help me. Then I asked if I might help Him. I ended up by asking Him to do His work through me".
